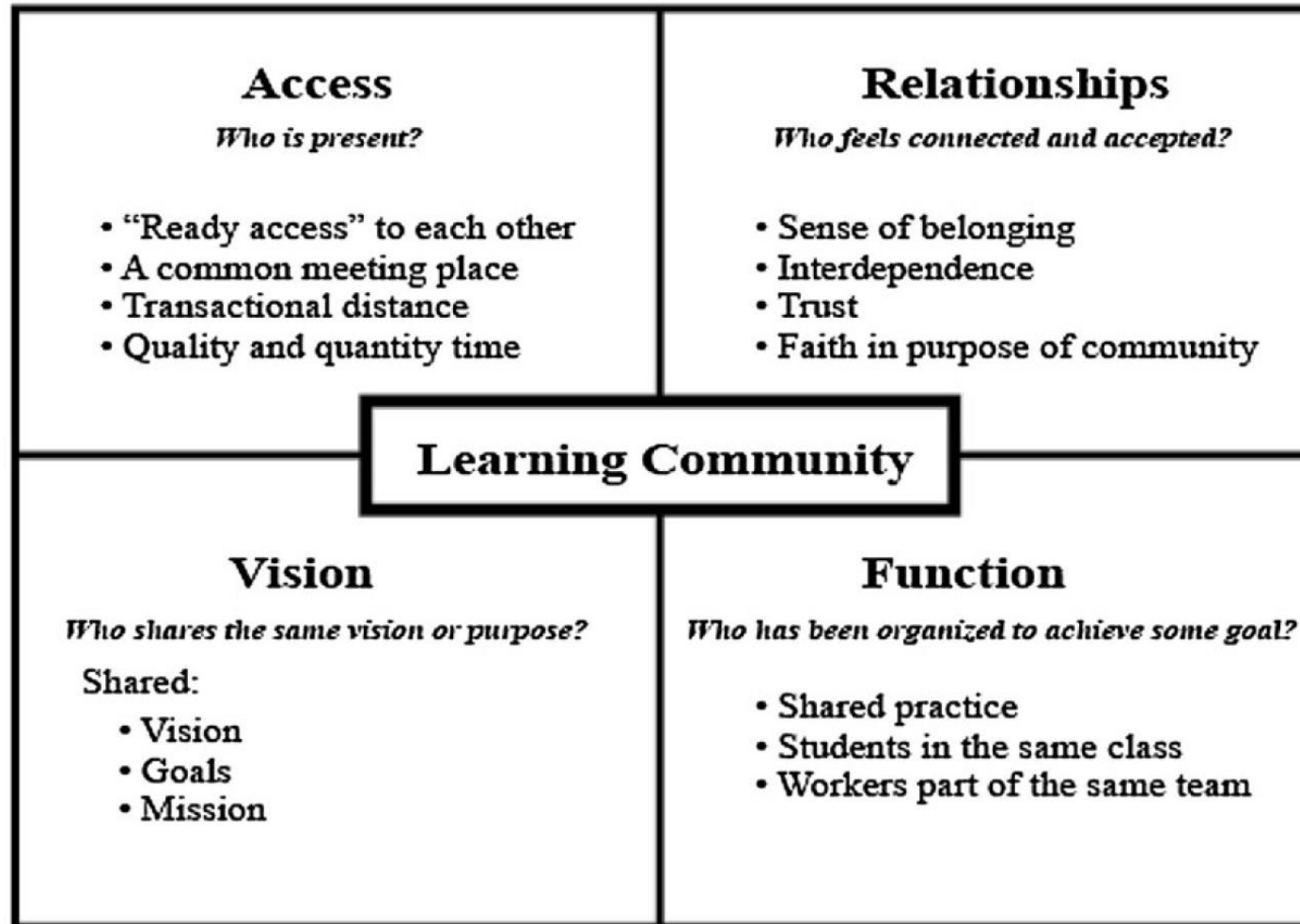

Why classroom community

- Challenges of forming, maintaining community during remote learning
- Social and intellectual activities need to be intentional in a virtual classroom
- First- and second-year students are less likely to have established relationships and shared experiences with other students in a course
- Research has identified that learning communities have many positive effects for students
 - Higher student engagement, development of cognitive skills, greater respect for diversity, increased motivation, greater satisfaction with learning experience (West and Williams, “...a proposed framework for defining learning communities,” pp.1569-70)

Defining Learning Communities

Building trust

- Different instincts at work in a virtual classroom
- How does trust develop between instructors and students?
- How do students better trust each other?
- Relationship between social environment and intellectual work
 - Need to feel respected and safe
 - Willingness to take risks, ask questions
- Importance of rules and norms (Major, *Teaching Online*, p.248)



Student feedback on particularly valuable practices

- Incorporate social (less formal) time
- Group work
- One-on-one time with the instructor
- Focus on quality rather than quantity of interactions
